## NEW-BRUNSWICK, (N. Jersey) Oct. 7.

On Tuesday last was celebrated in this place the annual commencement of Queens College—the procession was composed of the officers of the corporation—of the graduates—of the clergy and other literati from abroad in great numbers. The place of their meeting was Mr. Drake's, from thence they proceeded to the Dutch church, when they were seated the audience were entertained as follows, viz.

1. Music.
2. Prayer by the President.
3. Salutatory Oration in Latin, upon the evils of Avarice, by Alpheus Freeman.
4. An Oration in English upon the advantages of a public education in preference to a private one, by Jacob R. Hardenburg, jun.
5. Forensic dispute—Question, Whether the Federal Constitution, as formed and recommended by the General Convention, ought to be adopted by the United States, in preference to the confederation. Mr. Cole, respondent, Mr. Freeman, opponent, Mr. Hardenbergh, repliator.
6. Music.
7. An Oration in English, upon the improvement of time, by John Jackson.
8. The degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on the candidates, viz. Alpheus Freeman, Jacob J. Hardenberg, jun. Walter K. Cole, and John Jackson.
9. Charge to the Class by the President.
10. Music.
11. Valedictory Oration, upon human misery by Mr. Cole.
12. Music.
13. Prayer by the President.

The Degree of Master of Arts was conferred on Simon de Witt, Surveyor General of the State of New York, an alumnus of this college, and on the Rev. Isaac Blauvelt, of the State of New York.

On this pleasing event every countenance smiled approbation and every tongue spoke applause—The largest concourse of people were assembled we ever recollected to have seen on any similar occasion in this place. The charge from

the President was solemn and grave, and we hope will have the effect intended, on the minds of those to whom it was addressed.—The whole business was conducted with that propriety and decorum which is so characteristic of the President and Faculty of Queens College.

On Wednesday last the Society for the Relief of the Widows and Children of deceased Clergymen of the Episcopal Church, met at this place, when an excellent sermon was preached by the Rev. Dr. Andrews, of Philadelphia. And on Thursday morning an ordination was held in Christ Church, when Mr. George Ogilvie was ordained to the office of Deacon, by the Right Reverend Samuel Prevost, Bishop of the Episcopal Church in the State of New York, and Rector of Trinity Church. On this occasion a sermon, duly delineating the duties of the sacerdotal office was preached by the Reverend Mr. Ogden.

## New-York, Oct. 13.

No people yet known in history have appeared on the great theatre of human affairs, with such illustrious magnanimity as those of the United States of America: The ancient States of Greece, with much learning, and many fine maxims, were only taught to obtain government by the sword, to support it by the bloody hand of public severity, or the hidden point of dark assassination. The Romans conquered a world to make it miserable, while a faint glimpse of free urbanity answered no other purpose than to destroy millions. In the northern parts of Europe the feudal system, established in the dark unlettered ages, when the people then were, in point of understanding, at but a small remove from the savages of America, is now supported by standing armies in cruel and despotic governments. The kingdom of France, divided into many provinces by its conquerors, in the fourth century, has yet, as many independent parliaments; and by consequent divisions and animosities, each, in his turn, has become a dupe of a sovereign, and been employed in rivetting its own shackles, while it aided in forging manacles for another. The southern part of the island of Great Britain, was four hundred years engaged in bloody wars, in order to unite seven kingdoms in one; while each in its turn became the dupe and conquest of foreign auxiliaries, called in an hour of desperation to its support. The northern and southern parts of that realm, were not united in one government until about seventy years ago; and Ireland has yet its own parliament, owning a foreign sovereign, but guided by such acts of parliament as a foreign king will consent to.

In the True Briton, a vessel lately arrived at St. John, New-Brunswick, came sundry articles of cloathing, with some implements of husbandry, cash, &c. amounting in the whole, in value to 500l. sterl. being a donation from that truly christian society of people in England, called Quakers, to their brethren in that province, to be distributed among them, at the discretion of those gentlemen to whom they are consigned.

There are now 13 vessels on the stocks, building in the province of New Brunswick; five years ago that country was a desert.

Solomon, speaking of mankind says, "madness is in their hearts."—Had he lived in the United States, and witnessed the practice of our citizens in importing their breakfasts from China, their drinks from the West-India Islands, and their supper (when it consists of cheese) from Great-Britain, he would certainly have added, that "madness is in their stomachs." To remove this American malady, a correspondent begs to recommend the following receipts, as they are intended to form a FEDERAL DIET.

### BREAKFAST.

There is a substance called milk, much used by our ancestors as food, but now made use of only to fatten hogs. This milk may be used in a variety of ways for breakfast, either with bread, or rice, or Indian mush, or apple pyc, or with the ripe fruits of the season. After this a little American cheese may be taken with bread, if necessary. Salt meat of all kinds, and salt fish (which have been made a part of the American breakfast, in order to make up for the deficiency of tea and coffee as articles of diet) should never be tasted at breakfast. They provoke undue degrees of appetite, and, by exciting a troublesome thirst, often lead persons to drink more water than is wholesome, and in some instances to drink spirits and wine, or other kinds of strong drink, before dinner.

### DINNER.

All the meats and fishes of our country, with bread made of wheat, rye or Indian corn. Rye and Indian bread are more nutritious than wheat bread. A family that uses those two kinds of bread only, will save £. 12 or £. 15 a year by them. Fresh meat should as often as possible be made into soups or broths. Barley, or any of the vegetables of the season, boiled in these soups and broths, render them both more pleasant and wholesome. Broths are in a peculiar manner proper for children. The more vegetables that are eaten with meat the better. Pyes, apple-dumplings, and puddings of all kinds, may be eaten after or before the meat and vegetables before mentioned. The drink

with this meal should be beer, cyder, pomona wine, milk and water, or simple water.

### SUPPER.

The same as breakfast. (Penn. Packet.)

Extract of a letter from a French gentleman in Boston, to his friend in Martinico.

"Bad times! bad times! is the prevailing cry here with all orders, ranks and degrees.—This has been the complaint of all nations that history has given as any account of, from the creation to the deluge, and from the deluge to the present day; and I trust ever will be whilst we remain in this terrestrial state, notwithstanding what some crack'd brain'd visionaries may prognosticate of the coming of that happy time, when "the lion shall eat grafs like the ox, the wolf lie down with the lamb, &c." Such dreaming millenarians, I fancy, will find their conjectures "like the baseless fabrick of a vision." Divines and moralists may inveigh, rail, declaim and exclaim against the follies of mankind; but it will be attended with very little effect, for they will never be able to eradicate that depravity implanted in us by nature. People are much sooner laughed out of their follies than scolded out of them; therefore I think the laughing philosopher embraced the most eligible method of reforming the world, and that the crying one deferred to be laughed at, for thinking to amend it, by blubbering like a chastised school boy.

"Stoics will tell me that wise men never laugh, and that gravity is a mark of wisdom; and very sagaciously add, that "even in laughter the heart is sorrowful"—If what they tell us be true, we must acknowledge the ass and owl to be the wisest animals in creation—and as for the sorrow in laughing, he must have been but a sorry fellow who made the observation; for my part, I think it so delectable that nothing should induce me to part with it—besides, it is what distinguishes man from other animals as much as any thing whatever, none of them being gifted with this faculty.—Therefore let us laugh, for the more we do the less we resemble brutes; and surely this is commendable, and a mark of wisdom, maugre all the criers in the universe can say against it.—However the best way is to let the world do as they please, and look on and enjoy it.

"Happy the man, who, innocent,  
Grieves not at ills he can't prevent;  
His kiff does with the current glide,  
Not puffing pull'd against the tide:  
He paddling by the scuffling crowd,  
Sees unconcern'd life's swager row'd;  
And when he can't prevent foul play,  
Enjoys the follies of the fray."

"The conduct of these people do not correspond with their words; they preach up the necessity of frugality, and yet, such is the frailty of human nature, act directly the reverse.—They launch out into all the extravagance of European fashion, without the means to support themselves in it any length of time—consequently their ruin unavoidably ensues, in which perhaps that of numberless others is involved.—By this means the country is crowded with desperate fellows, who will ever be striving to create dissensions and animosities, in order, if possible, to throw every thing into confusion, in expectation of seizing something amid the general scramble.—Therefore luxury and extravagance ought to be banished from republics; for none ever remained long unmolested by internal commotions, when these vices predominated.

"It is the custom here to have pretty little coaches made, in which their children are drawn about wherever they wish to go, by servants.—You will smile to find me noticing such a trivial matter—yet, trivial as it is, may produce bad consequences, both to the children thus indulged, and to the community. It has a tendency to destroy that equality, which ought ever to be encouraged in republics: For these children, being nursed up with an idea that they are superior to all others, will forever retain it; and when introduced into public life, they will endeavour to realize their presumed superiority, by trampling on the laws of their country; and, perhaps, like Cæsar, stride to dominion through the blood of its most worthy citizens. In none is the passion for finery more conspicuous than in the ladies of this place; even the poorest labourer's wife is as desirous to shine in silk and satin as her rich neighbours.—This would be less censurable, did they obtain their finery by industry, which to their shame is not the case—"like the lillies of the valley, they toil not, neither do they spin;" and I believe I might, without infringing on truth, add, that "even Solomon in all his glory was not array'd like one of these."—At the house of a poor widow woman where I boarded, the old lady was obliged to do all the drudgery, and labour hard night and day, to maintain an idle, lazy, strong daughter, in fashionable indolence.—Miss would be all the forenoon at her glass, before which stood a little pine table, with a dirty cloth over it—this she chinkened by the polite name of twilight, (meaning I suppose toilet) for she was very dexterous at knocking words out of joint.—Once, when speaking of an acquaintance of hers, who prostituted herself to the embraces of every one—says she, "Oh! the odious creature! She has become quite a liberty woman of the town." The hoop, or circumference of

charms, is universally worn by them all even in the depth of winter, although it is calculated entirely for summer. They have likewise a custom of lacing themselves very tight in stiff stays, which is not only very prejudicial to health, but also very unbecoming, as it destroys that proportion and symmetry of parts which alone constitute elegance.—One would suppose, from their appearance, that they endeavoured to imitate the waltz, by being very small in the center, and having a very large bottle latter-end. There are as many materials in the composition of a full-dressed Boston lady, as there were in Nebuchadnezzar's image; nor do they come behind that in the homage they expect will be paid them.

"One day I was conversing with one of the rulers of the town respecting the extravagance of the women's apparel—He excused them in some degree by observing that they were "weaker vessels;" but, continued he, it answers a very good purpose, for we take particular notice of those who dress richly, and when we proportion the taxes, we don't fail to make a considerable addition to their bill on that account; for we presume, that, if a person can pay so great a tax to his pride, he can surely pay a small one to the state; and we look upon extravagant dress as a challenge to us, to tax higher. Thus we bring good out of evil.

"In my next I will resume this subject.—Farewell."
